About The Don Valley Way

The Don Valley Way is a 29 mile long walking trail that follows the River Don from Doncaster to Sheffield. The whole trail can be used by walkers and approximately half of it can be used by cyclists.

The trail is part of a Heritage Lottery funded project celebrating the history and wildlife of the River Don.

Following the trail takes you on a journey of discovery. In places the Don passes through green fields with wildflowers and dragonflies, if you are lucky you might see the flash of a kingfisher. In other areas you pass mills and factories, buildings that show how important industry was along the Don.

The trail is never far from the railway line, making it perfect for a walk out and a train ride back. It's well waymarked and easy to follow.
